We had an exciting and eventful 2022 here at Can Do Canines. We certified 51 new teams and continued to focus on our strategic objectives of better serving and engaging our clients, volunteers, and staff; increasing our profile and reaching new communities; and creating new ways to serve people with disabilities.

We formed many new partnerships, advanced our new facility dog and skilled home companion programs, and launched a Pups at Work (PAW) pilot program with Best Buy. And our incredible staff continued to find innovative ways to serve our clients and engage our volunteers and supporters.

This year is proving to be even more exciting than last. We have set a 40% growth goal for the next ten years, begun to plan for an addition to our current building that will solve multiple space needs and allow us to whelp puppies on-site in partnership with volunteers, and purchased a facility in New Germany, Minnesota, that will allow us to start whelping puppies now until our new addition is complete.





AUTISM

Autism Assist Dogs keep children with autism safe in public settings and help them experience the world more fully by offering comfort and assurance. These special dogs also serve as a social bridge between the family and the public.











HEARING

Hearing Assist Dogs alert a person who is deaf or hard of hearing to sounds by making physical contact with them and leading them to the source of the sound

Diabetes Assist Dogs detect low blood sugar levels by sensing a change in their partner's breath odor. The dog alerts their partner by making physical contact.



FACILITY DOGS IMPACT COUNTLESS LIVES

In 2022, Can Do Canines began a pilot program of training facility dogs. A facility dog is trained to work at a designated location with a variety of people, rather than just one person. While the dogs are still task trained, like assistance dogs, the tasks they perform are done for someone other than their handler.



This concept isn't entirely new for us. In 2018, one Can Do Canine joined the Orono Police Department as a Community Service Dog. This past year, however, we placed four facility dogs with M Health Fairview: Tasha, Fern, and Inka started at Masonic Children's Hospital, and another, Clayton, became the first facility dog in Minnesota to join an emergency medical services team.

Whether these dogs help demonstrate hospital procedure to young patients (taking blood pressure, placing an IV, etc.), offer support for stressful situations, play fetch to incentivize physical therapy, or any number of other tasks, they benefit the lives of multiple people every day.

Remarking on this new relationship with Can Do Canines, one M Health Fairview representative said, "We feel incredibly lucky to be part of this family of outstanding volunteers and an outstanding organization with such a strong reputation in our community."
