





MOBILITY ASSIST

Mobility Assist Dogs work with people who have mobility challenges and other needs. They pick up and carry objects, turn on lights, open doors and help pay at tall counters.















































AUTISM ASSIST

Autism Assist Dogs keep children with autism safe in public settings and help them experience the world more fully by offering comfort and assurance. These special dogs also serve as a social bridge between the family and the public.











DIABETES ASSIST

Diabetes Assist Dogs detect low blood sugar levels by sensing a change in their partner's breath odor. The dog alerts their partner by making physical contact.





SEIZURE ASSIST

Seizure Assist Dogs respond to a person having a seizure by licking their face, retrieving an emergency phone and alerting other family members.



COMBINATION SKILLS DOGS

Combination Skills Dogs assist their partners with tasks from at least two of our team types.

FACILITY DOGS

A facility dog is trained to work at a designated location with a variety of people. Typically this type of dog is placed in a hospital or a rehab center.









HEARING ASSIST

Hearing Assist Dogs alert a person who is deaf or hard of hearing to sounds by making physical contact with them and leading them to the source of the sound.









WE WHELPED A WHELPING CENTER!

In August 2023, we purchased a property in New Germany, Minnesota—about 45 minutes southwest of our New Hope location. We bought this site, which is in addition to our current facility, to serve as a whelping center.



Whelping is the process of a dog giving birth. Our new Whelping and Growth (WAG) Center is where puppies born into our breeding program spend their first 5-6 weeks of life.

Previously, Can Do Canines volunteers opened up their homes to care for these dogs. Whelping homes welcomed the expectant mom about 10 days before

her due date and continued the care through the first several weeks of her puppies' lives. These volunteers provided continuous care to the dog and pups, with Can Do Canines offering 24/7 support through the process.

We opened this WAG Center to ease the burden on volunteers. Now, we can offer shifts at this new location, where the Can Do Canines Breeding Coordinator and three part-time Canine Nursery Assistants office. Dozens of volunteers also help care for the newborn puppies and their mamas.

The WAG Center is a temporary solution to our whelping needs while we move forward with an expansion project at our New Hope site. We plan to add on to the main facility and include a whelping center—along with other space needs (more offices, additional client apartments, etc.), with hopes of having construction completed in 2027.



2023 AT A GLANCE
